To not submit a great matter to counsel in fear that godly counsel would be against it is to act a fool and partner with deception

"Plausible deniability" describes a situation in which someone actively avoids gaining certain knowledge of facts they suspect to exist because it benefits them to "not know." In legal matters, lawyers may use this tactic to get around ethics violations. In politics, officials may use this to avoid being connected to some operation they support, and in your house a child may use it to get out of trouble they brought on themselves – "But I didn't *know!*"

The truth of the matter is that we usually *do* know when something we're thinking about or planning is wrong before we even do it. God's Word tells us that the Holy Spirit points out sin, and that He guides His children in all truth (John 15:8,13). To not submit a great matter to counsel in fear that godly counsel would be against it is to act a fool and partner with deception. That is a hair's breadth away from saying "I know this is wrong, but I'm doing it anyway." And *that* is a dangerous place to be.
